The meeting at the Hall on July 13, regarding the recent spate of burglaries, had a great turnout and was a valuable source of information for all those that attended.

Les Duffield shared some great tips on alarms, security lights and buzzers to warn residents of people on their property. Mitre 10, Lincoln Road have a particularly helpful assistant who is passionate about security and willing to help those on the lookout for better protection. Other helpful tips were 'Beware of the Dog' and 'This Property is Monitored' signs on letterboxes, lockable gates and motion detector cameras, to name just a few.

Alarms of the past were constantly going off for no apparent reason, and we now tend to ignore our neighbours' alarms. But technology has improved significantly over the years and these alarms don't go off without a reason. Therefore we should react to our neighbours' alarms; get car registration numbers, descriptions of people and report anything that looks suspicious. But please don't confront anyone, leave this to the experts – the Police.

Neighbourhood Watch came to an end due to lack of funds, but it is in the process of being replaced by a new scheme, 'Neighbourhood Support Waitakere'. Les Duffield is currently on the lookout for residents to be liaison members – specifically for Mountain, Cascade, Tui, Raroa, Rimu, Atarua and Forest Hill Roads. There were people that attended the meeting that had continued Neighbourhood Watch on their own accord, with fantastic results. In one area there were reports of no burglaries at all since the scheme had been put in place. So these schemes do work, but of course the community needs to get behind it.

The Arataki Rangers' Roundup

Well, what a wild and woolly month it has been! Heavy rain fall and strong winds have seen more windfalls than usual. Staff have been busy removing these obstructions from the tracks and removing debris from drains that could cause surface flooding. Overall the Park escaped significant damage, with a minimum of disruption to services.

The same weather patterns have hindered some of the planting days throughout the region. In an effort to address these delays, a team is set to tackle a planting project at Te Rau Puriri. Te Rau Puriri is the newly acquired name for the Park on the Kaipara. It is a recent addition to the ARC and it is hoped that the thousands of *Kanuka* and *Manuka* to be planted will establish successive regeneration on what used to be primarily a farmed block.

After consultation and fine tuning of the design, construction has begun on the upgrade of the Arataki Visitor Centre Toilets. With the upstairs area of the Visitor Centre receiving regular updates, it was thought to be time for the toilet area downstairs to be brought up to a comparable level. During this time the toilets will be closed to visitors but there are still toilet facilities open behind the Education Centre. Completion is projected for the first week of September. **Be sure to schedule in a quick stop-over on your next visit!**

Safety Tip – Wheat Bags

Always place a glass of water in the microwave with the wheat bag. This replenishes the water content in the grain, maintains the effectiveness of the bag as a hot pack and prevents the grain drying out. If the bag is overheated an irreversible deterioration of the grain can occur – signs are an overcooked odour, smell of burning or charring and, in extreme cases, smoking. If this happens than you should let it cool down thoroughly on a non-combustible surface (e.g. vanity unit or metal bench-top) before disposing of it.

FOCUS ON BUSINESS

Raised by a mother who sang in *Gilbert and Sullivan* productions since before he can remember, and a Methodist minister father who heavily influenced his participation and involvement in music, John Goudge's love of drama and music was probably inevitable. As a four-year-old boy soprano, John sang in *Joseph and his Amazing Technicolour Dream Coat*. At 10, he began to learn the piano.

These days, John Goudge is a familiar name in Waiatarua. His professional time is split between teaching drama, playing in his own band, and involvement in community theatre. A journalist by profession, John's move into drama as a serious business came 10 years ago, when Donna Clark (of *Gloss* fame in the 1980s) closed her drama studio where John had been teaching classes for her. John took over the existing classes, building up to six or seven classes. Until three years ago, John also taught at the Titirangi Theatre.

Around seven years ago, John and Kathy purchased their home in Rimu Rd (he refers to Kathy as 'my lovely partner'). With an existing studio, the need to find venues to rent for classes came to a welcome end. It's probably worth joining one of John's classes just to spend a bit of time in his unique studio; from the full-length windows along one wall overlooking the bush, to the fabulous outside decks and warming wood fire inside, it's a treasure that John is constantly working to improve and upgrade.

John's classes cover a range of age groups (now all adults) and abilities. His students are there for reasons ranging from wanting a personal challenge, to a need for improved confidence and presentation skills, or to hone skills for amateur or professional theatre.

John has always enjoyed playing the guitar and singing for friends, but 1995 saw the beginning of his foray into music at a different level, with a performance of his own original music at the Titirangi Theatre. Today, the John Goudge band consists of eight dedicated and talented members. In 2006, at West Point Centre in Motions Road, the band debuted with their own concert. They've since played at events such as the Waitakere Christmas Festival, and regularly perform at a variety of venues. More exciting times are ahead as the band works towards the release of their first album (all John's original compositions) at the end of the year.

Those who attended the *Great Waiatarua Dinner and Debate* in June will no doubt have enjoyed John's performance as a member of the debating team – he was quite impressed at how many people heckled him! His involvement in local drama clubs has now completed a full circle – 20 years ago, prior to becoming involved with Titirangi Theatre, John had the lead role in a production of *The Nerd* with the Waiatarua Drama Club. Today, he is president of the newly formed Waiatarua Performing Arts Trust; my guess would be that they feel pretty fortunate to have him.

ARTHRITIS IN PETS

WHAT IS IT? Arthritis is the inflammation of a joint. There are many joints in the body, but it is usually the limbs that are affected. It can affect one joint, or many. The lining of the joint, called cartilage, is involved and is very important in treatment. **WHAT ARE THE SIGNS?** A classic sign is that when he's had his walk, your pet flops down in his bed for a snooze, and can hardly walk when he tries to get up later. Usually he will have problems climbing the stairs or jumping into the car. The sooner this is looked into the better, to prevent the condition worsening. **HOW IS THE DIAGNOSIS MADE?** An x-ray will be taken of the dog's leg, usually under a general anaesthetic. This is necessary because the dog will lie still, so that better pictures can be taken and it can all be over quickly and smoothly. **WHAT IS THE TREATMENT?** This involves daily medication, tablets or liquid, alone or in combination. Most are easy to remember and to give. It's worthwhile to know that if one drug is not effective, another might be. As in humans, some dogs respond differently to different treatments. **IMPORTANT RULES:** There are some important rules that need to be followed! **WEIGHT** – weight control is crucial as this is the key to success in keeping your dog comfortable. **EXERCISE** – this is a bit tricky, too much will make it worse, and too little can make the joints seize up. **MEDICATION** – we now have medications that work well.

We are hoping that this bin will be there permanently, but this depends on how well it is used and whether it will be abused, so at the moment it is on trial only. Please note that this bin is for environmental weeds only and NOT for general garden waste and other household rubbish.
