EcoWise Community Awards 2005

The aim of the 'EcoWise Community Awards' is to celebrate and honour the people of Waitakere City who show a commitment to beautifying their City and caring for their environment through volunteer action and pride.

Categories:

The Kauri Award - Most active individual volunteer working in the community to beautify Waitakere City, or reduce litter, weeds and graffiti.

The Totara Award - Most active group of volunteers working in the community to beautify Waitakere City, or reduce litter, weeds and graffiti (may include church groups, sports clubs or any other community group).

The Rewarewa Award - Best native residential garden in an urban environment - the garden which best reflects Waitakere City's eco-systems with a range of flora attractive to native birds.

The Kowhai Award - Best urban residential vegetable garden - the garden which meets the food needs of the family living at the property.

The Pohutukawa Award - Best school grounds - the tidiest and best presented grounds which are litter and graffiti-free through ongoing action by the students. The judges will also consider gardens within the school grounds which have been planted and tended by the students.

The Puriri Award - Best shop frontage - the most attractive individual shop or group of shops (outside a mall environment) which present a visually attractive, litter and graffiti-free view to passersby.

The Rimu Award - Most presentable street - the street which is the tidiest, cleanest, litter and graffiti-free street in Waitakere City through neighbourhood action

Conditions of Entry:

Nominations close at 5pm on Friday 7th October 2005. All nominations must be in writing. Photographs (print or digital printouts) should accompany nomination forms if possible. Any resident of Waitakere City may enter the 'EcoWise Community Awards' on their own behalf or by nominating another party. Judging of each category will be carried out by a panel of judges representing Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust, Waitakere City Community Boards and the Waitakere City Council. The judges' decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into. The nomination forms and accompanying documents become the property of Keep Waitakere Beautiful Trust and may be used for promotional purposes. Winners will receive a certificate and prizes. The winners will be announced at a Civic function to be held at Waitakere City Council Chambers on Friday 28th October 2005 between 5 - 7pm.

The completion of Waiatarua's public facility in the early 1970's must have been an auspicious occasion. At last people sharing common interests were able to meet in larger numbers outside of their own homes.

Waiatarua soon sprung an early drama group which led on to the building of their very own clubhouse, called 'Badgers', still standing in all its glory at the bottom of the driveway. I'm sure the hall would have hosted a great variety of events over the years. Those floorboards must have steadfastly supported thousands of tapping feet at many a lively shin-dig. No doubt, the place was often thick with smoke in the days of 'cigarette acceptance' – the perfect atmosphere for those raunchy love-at-first looks across crowded rooms.

Of course the WRRRA meetings brought a different facet to the goings on within. Countless heated discussions most definitely would have taken place, naturally with the community's best interests at heart. The association obviously also made the most of the venue by organising information evenings, meet the candidates sessions, community breakfasts, wine and cheese nights, Autumn Festivals and the like.

1996 to 2002 saw the community centre rocked by the trilogy series "Phone 1125-J", the Fire Brigade's much appreciated contribution to performing arts, which went on to form a TV documentary.

Let's not forget the quaint community library, housed in the hall basement, and enjoyed by those of us who prefer to select their reading from this tranquil environment rather than battle the traffic of suburbia.

Keeping things in the family, a neighbouring playcentre continues to responsibly provide fun and education to local kids. Bravo!

Getting back to 'talking walls' however, my mind runs away with me visualising weddings, anniversaries, birthdays, barbecues, music-halls, rummage sales, karate classes, slide shows and more recently – civil union celebrations.

With the passage of time, additions arrived and upgrades have occurred e.g. heaters, new curtains, comfortable chairs, an annexe, wheelchair-access bathroom, new kitchen with modern appliances etc.

Nevertheless, the ladies toilet represents an icon, almost too precious to replace. Who in their right mind could contemplate silencing those beloved rattling pipes which have carried gallons of water to many a hearty flush?

Well, we heard from six people, three before newsletter release (including Tony) and three after.

I'm sure there are others who never responded but more importantly, criticisms were made about the present committee which I take exception to.

As President I only have one vote on committee but I do have an obligation and duty to guide the committee in the right direction, so I also take such comments personally.

How does one end up as President? Well basically, turn up at the A.G.M put your hand up (usually the only one) and you're it. Nobody is interested in how you see the association running, what your ideals are or anything; other than 'some sucker took the job'.

Well I'm going to tell you how this sucker thinks, in case I decide to stand in February; thus giving you plenty of time to stand or vote against me. The first thing I'll make clear is that nothing has changed my mind on the decision we made this time about political candidates meetings, and in fact Oratia came to the same decision. The other thing is, as far as I'm concerned, just because it was always done that way in the past doesn't mean it was right, popular or will be done again.

I have studied the constitution and have copied the Objects as they appear with comments to each one:

OBJECTS:

The objects of the Association which is a 'non-party political' Association shall be:

1. To encourage and organise combined efforts to achieve the objects hereinafter set forth.

Comment - Standard opening item.

2. To co-operate with the Statutory Bodies in looking after the affairs of the District and to secure the maximum fair expenditure of the General Rates levied by such Bodies within the District for the benefit of ratepayers, residents and visitors.

Comment - This to me means to work with and monitor the activities of the Waitakere City Council as it affects our area. We have representation at most community board meetings, working parties such as: Ranges Protection, long term district plan, wastewater management. We have liased on behalf of individuals as well as the community on matters concerning Wheelie bins, septic tank cleaning, road safety and many others.

3. To pursue and undertake any activity with the object of establishing, improving or preserving social, cultural or sporting activities or amenities or the unique natural environment of the area.

Comment - This is to me the fun part and in the last 18 months we have re-established the drama club, held a community breakfast, information night (who ,what ,why), volunteers xmas B.B.Q, produce a monthly newsletter (which I might add is the envy of neighbouring Ratepayers groups) and are currently working on another breakfast, b.b.q. and the Autumn Festival. With other activities in the pipeline. . .

4. To co-operate with or act in support of any person or organisation in or towards the achievements of the objects of the Association.

Comment - Well covered above.

I am proud of what we as a committee have achieved in the last 18 months, and it is my intention we will continue on a similar path.

Two comments we received were: "Principal reason for our existence was to provide public debate forums" and "Political candidates meeting the single most important thing we do". If that's the case I'm the wrong man, as I believe a good community environment for the majority is our mandate.

The original notification of no meeting was in the July newsletter and it took a month for the first complaint. Instead of complaining, somebody could have offered their services to organise or help organise one.

You have an enthusiastic committee covering many age groups and we intend to move forward with new direction and focus. Thanks. - *Dave Pocock*

Fire Brigade

Outside fires don't need a fire permit until the end of November. You DO still need to follow Council bylaws - the fire must be supervised, out by sunset, at least 10 metres from a building and 3 metres from the boundary, have a cleared area around it and have some means of control (e.g. a hose). You can be required to extinguish it at any time if it is a nuisance to your neighbours or the Fire Brigade believe it to be unsafe.

Recent Calls

As at the time of writing, it's seven weeks since the fire siren last sounded in anger on 29th July. Well done everyone!

The Fire Station was used as a base for a Police search on Wednesday the 14th of September. There was concern about an elderly gentleman missing for several hours after visiting a relative in Waiatarua. The Police helicopter and dog teams had been searching for a couple of hours, and Search and Rescue volunteers were starting to set up when he was located safe and well.

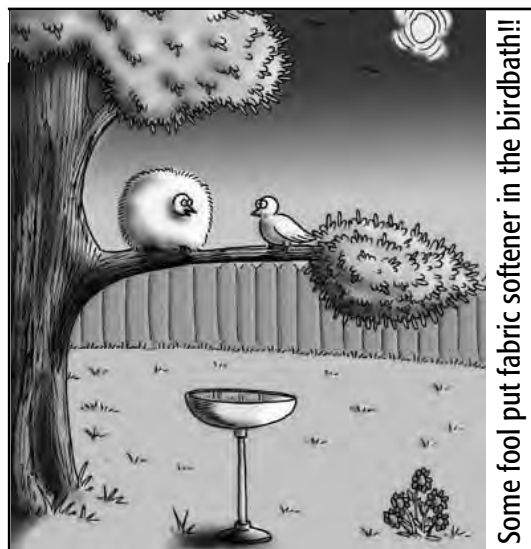
About Neighbourhood Support New Zealand

The Arataki Rangers RoundUp

Kia ora. It seems like spring has arrived early to the Waitakere Ranges. The kowhai and clematis are already in flower and the tuis are having a ball around Arataki. We have been busy with general maintenance of the park over the last month, taking advantage of the great weather to do some weed control and track work.

We have installed two new seats on the Zig Zag track. The seats were made by Bill Beveridge of the Friends of Arataki after a donation was made to the group. The Friends of Arataki chose the seat locations to give great views and tranquil resting spots on the track.

Over the next couple of months we will be running a Pig Control programme throughout the park. The objectives of this programme are to remove all feral pigs within the Waitakere Ranges. This programme will also meet Animal Health Board requirements for the testing of TB. Pig control will be undertaken by three hunting teams and will occur on weekdays only. For information regarding dates and areas for control, please phone the Arataki Visitor Centre on 817-0077.

Finally, some mystery at Whatipu Lodge for you... recently a team of contractors had an interesting find when excavating the tennis court at Whatipu Lodge. Whilst digging up the concrete, they noticed some teeth and fragments of bone. The digging was put on hold while a team of archaeologists came to investigate the discovery. A number of bone fragments (including human, bird, sheep, cow) along with nails, window glass, obsidian flakes, railway spikes, slate pencils were found. Dr Lisa Matisoo-Smith (University of Auckland) identified the 'use wear' pattern on the teeth as typical of pre-European Maori. The remains were not indicative of a primary burial and were in a very disturbed deposit. This material most likely represents a collection of fossicked material gathered by itinerant visitors to Whatipu and later discarded!
