BAKING:

3 scones (open individual)
Sponge cake (open individual)
Bloke's chocolate cake (no age limit)
Kid's plate of biscuits (under 5yrs; 5 - 8yrs; 9 - 12yrs)
Home brew ginger beer (open individual or family)

CRAFTS:

Homemade card and envelope (under 5yrs; 5 - 8yrs; 8 - 12yrs; adult)
Needlework (hand or machine, up to 500mm X 500mm) (child; adult)
Decorated egg (under 9 yrs; 9 - 12yrs)



Competition rules

- 'Adult or family' means that adult and family entries will be judged together as one category.
- 'Child' is 12 years and under
- Garden produce must be grown in Waiatarua (we're lenient with boundaries but no tomatoes from Nana's in Henderson or pumpkins from Uncle Joe's in Kumeu etc.)
- Baking categories may be taste-tested by judges and afterwards will be auctioned off by silent auction (all proceeds to Hall Tables).

Local Female Firefighter Brings Home Two Gold

Waiatarua's deputy chief fire officer, Helen Longley, returned home from last month's World Firefighters Games in Hong Kong with two of New Zealand's twelve gold medals, one for indoor rowing and the other for squash (masters). This is the second time Helen has taken part in these international competitions, and she plans to attend the 2008 games in Liverpool. It was 2004 at Sheffield where she picked up 'a silver' for squash.

Helen says she has only visited Hong Kong on one other occasion for a very short period, in transit. This time around she "met lots of people, had fun and enjoyed sightseeing".

Helen has been a member of the Waiatarua Fire Brigade for 10½ years, initially joining when the brigade was short of volunteers. She says her thoughts then were... 'This could be interesting'.

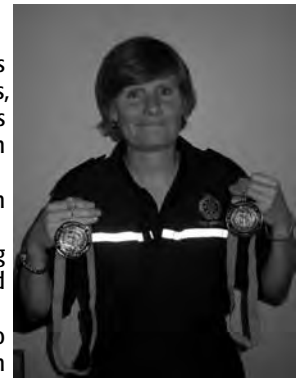
Helen's full-time employment at Longley Printing keeps her busy, but she still manages to dedicate four or five hours a week to the fire brigade and spends extra time keeping fit on the squash court.

Since its conception in 1990, with New Zealand hosting the first, World Firefighters Games take place bi-annually. They are designed to provide firefighters from all around the world with an opportunity to share experiences and fortify comradeship. The games are widely regarded in the firefighting community as mini Olympics, where like-minded people are able to meet and compete. At least fifty sports/games are available ranging from a variety of track & field and ball game competitions, to specialist activities.

Helen Longley is quick to shed the limelight and mention that Angela Munroe from Otahuhu also brought home gold, in 'Toughest Firefighter Alive' (women's division).

And let's not forget Kerry Chislett was the second Kiwi home in Seattle's Tower Stair Climb challenge in the USA. His time for the trot up to the 69th floor was 16 minutes and 38 seconds - in full firefighting kit with breathing apparatus.

Hi all... What a month it has been - with Resource Consent matters, Ward Boundaries, the AGM, and The Fire Brigade Play.

I have had contact with concerned residents of Raroa Terrace about what would appear to be an anomaly. It would seem that resource consent has been granted to build a 5 metre x 5 metre garage on land designated as road reserve. The residents have written to council and at this point a reply is awaited. We will monitor this, and look forward to a satisfactory result which I hope to report on next month.

The Council held an information meeting, regarding the proposed changes to Ward Boundaries for the current Waitakere Ward, in our Hall on the 14th of February. I am pleased to say that this was the best-attended meeting of the four held. Unfortunately, very few Waiatarua residents were among those numbers. Although advertised in this newsletter and by the Waitakere City News, I counted (apart from committee members) five residents. Are the rest of us happy for somebody else to make decisions on our future for us?

The following week was our AGM - a successful night, although once again local residents conspicuous by their absence. Apart from committee, there were seven. If you are one of the many that did not attend these or other meetings we have held, I would like to know why there seems to be a lack of interest and would appreciate a phone call, e-mail or letter (anonymous if you wish). At the AGM Mayor Bob Harvey gave an interesting and informative presentation on Waitakere City past, present and future; after which we all had the opportunity to ask him questions on various matters.

We have an elected committee for 2006/2007, which is the 2005/2006 committee minus Molly Whittington and Jeannette Ziesler. Molly and Jeannette stood down this year due to family commitments, and I thank them both sincerely for the valuable contribution they have made. Both have agreed to complete projects that they are already involved in – Molly, the Autumn Festival; and Jeannette, the Wastewater Management committee.

EcoCity Gets Eco Smart

Prime Minister Helen Clark praised EnviroSmart™, an environmental business programme set to change the way New Zealand companies do business, at the programme's launch recently.

The EnviroSmart™ programme will focus on improving the environmental performance and resource use of over 500 businesses throughout the country. It is based on an Auckland Region Pilot programme involving 58 businesses, 10 of which are local businesses currently sponsored by Waitakere City.

"I'm a great fan of what's happening, it's the way forward for advanced economies like ours," The Prime Minister told the audience.

The five-year, \$3 million dollar EnviroSmart™ programme, to be delivered by Landcare Research, promises to benefit both participants and New Zealand as a whole. Businesses will sign up to reduce solid waste and use energy, water and raw materials efficiently, as well as to produce and purchase environmentally sound products and services.

Waitakere City Council will be sponsoring twenty businesses over the next three years to become EnviroSmart™ businesses. Council Project Manager, Cleaner Production, Kelly Taylor says it is an excellent way of ensuring local businesses get behind the EcoCity vision.

"The plan is to provide businesses with all the tools they need to gain a recognised environmental accreditation through a well-structured programme," says Ms Taylor. "Alto Plastics and Lisa's Healthy Foods are two Waitakere companies already leading the way – they have been certified to EnviroMark®NZ Silver level."

Other Waitakere companies on the pilot programme include Cremer Engineering (manufacturer of disability chair-lifts), Fumapest (pest control and personal hygiene), Future Cuisine, Huhtamaki New Lynn (plastics), Norcross Printing, Powder Coating 1988 Ltd., Tegel Foods and The Sellotape Company (adhesives).

Programme costs are shared between business participants and funding sponsors, including local and regional councils. The Prime Minister said the initiative is "a fantastic example of thinking globally and acting locally". She said most businesses would like to be more environmentally friendly, but need the sort of guidance offered by the EnviroSmart™ programme to get them started. "We have to act a lot more boldly on sustainability than we have been," Helen Clark said.

Donated Table Walks

A \$1300 macrocarpa picnic table, donated to the Arataki Visitor Centre by the Friends of Arataki, has been stolen. The incident took place under the watchful eye of video surveillance, which captured the culprits unbolting the table and tying it to their vehicle during early morning hours. Police are following strong leads to track down those responsible.

The table was one of two, designed for wheelchair access and paid for with a grant from The Waitakere Licensing Trust. Vandalism and stolen property is on the increase at Waitakere Ranges' parks and beaches. Over \$4000 worth of safety signs was stolen from Piha beach, then later found damaged. Two toilets at Manukau Harbour beaches were hit by arsonists.

Arataki ranger Jonathan Gould is disappointed that money earmarked to improve parks and make them safe has to be spent on repairing broken or stolen items and cleaning up graffiti.

The Regional Council may consider installing lockable gates at the visitor centre to keep the public out after hours.

On-site Waste Water Liaison Group

Meeting 28th February 2006.

Residents Info: Information pamphlet and letter was approved for distribution to all residents. Letter includes 'change of details' form to ensure WCC records are up-to-date.

Draft Action Plan: (Plan for improving on-site waste water disposal). Contains planned actions, time-line and costs for improvements over 10-year period. Maximum extra funding available, inflation taken into account, is \$90,000.

Plan was not approved. Only opposition was from Huia rep. as no money has been made available for a stage 2 of "Huia Demonstration Project". Rep. will have approval (or not) from her group for next meeting. Budget allocation can not be adjusted for this so the only option, if agreed by group, is to re-allocate funds from other actions.

LIM Records: LIM's to be updated to include recommendation that: a) intending purchaser to get septic tank checked before purchase. b) if a 'high-tech' system, check to ensure maintenance agreement is in place and regular checks are carried out. c) advise last pump-out report be accessed.

Water Quality Reports: These to be e-mailed to affected areas as soon as received (beach and stream areas).

By-Law Update: New by-law required by 1st July 2008. Draft required by November. This group will continue to have input on this.
