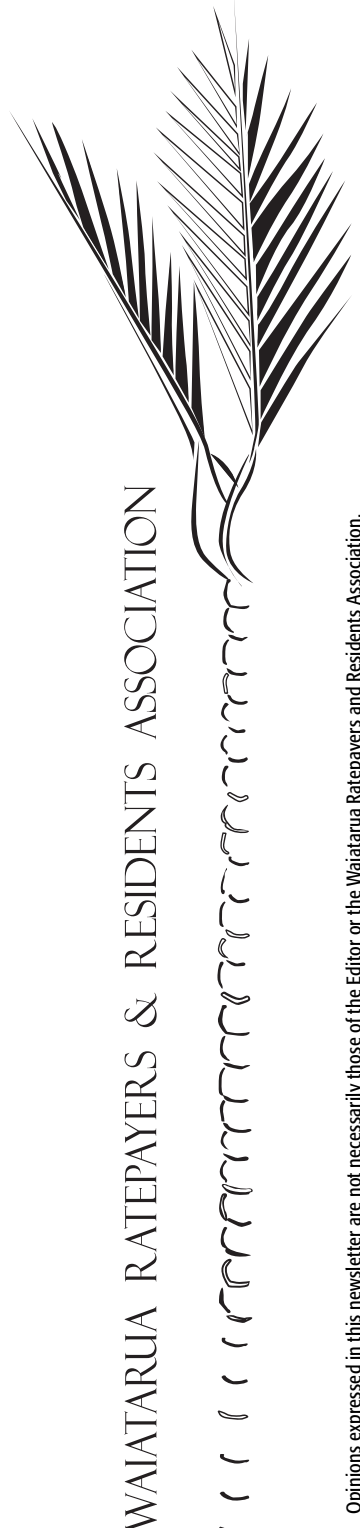

By 1830 colonisation was out of vogue in Britain. The colonial office was highly influenced by humanitarian ideals which considered the expansion of the empire to be immoral in its detriment to indigenous peoples (such as Maori). New Zealand was in the antipodes – as a potential colonial possession it was flung as far as it was possible to be. In addition it didn't promise the opportunities of wealth such as were offered by India, Australia and Africa. All in all it seemed to be more trouble than it was worth, yet by 1840 Lieutenant William Hobson had been despatched to New Zealand by Queen Victoria with orders to negotiate a Treaty whereby Maori would cede sovereignty to the Crown, formal government would be created and land title issues dealt with. In other words all aspirations for independence were abandoned and New Zealand was to become a fully-fledged colony of Britain. How did this about-face happen?

As the Author of 'Fatal Frontiers' and 'The Treaty and its Times' books that specifically tell the story of the years leading up to 1840 and beyond – Hobsonville historian Professor Paul Moon is qualified like few others to speak on that period. Find out some little known facts about this fascinating time in our history.

Fire Brigade

Well winter is well and truly on the way. The days are distinctly truncated and the welcoming smell of fires drifts through the hills, valleys and dells of Waiatarua. I know we've said it before and we will definitely be saying it again (repeatedly), but please ensure that you have your chimneys swept. With the abundance of wildlife in the hills, who knows what may have nested in your chimney over the summer months.

Waitakere has moved onto an open fire season as of 30 April 2008. This means permits are not required for fires in the open air. City Bylaw No. 6 applies which, broken down into its basic form, is as follows:

- Only natural materials (no plastics, treated wood, polystyrene etc) are to be burnt.
- The fire is to be attended at all times.
- Means to extinguish the fire are to be available at all times.
- There must be no burning closer than 3 metres from your neighbour's boundary.
- There must be no burning closer than 10 metres from any structure or public boundary.
- There must be no burning after dark.
- There must not be a smoke nuisance.

If you need advice then a Rural Fire Officer is only a phone call away on 839 0400, or call Karl Nuttall who is a warranted Rural Fire Officer in his day job.

Members of the Brigade recently participated in the Sky City Challenge (stair climb) to raise funds for the Leukaemia and Blood Foundation. Over \$90,000 was handed over to the LBF as a result of the fundraising efforts of all of the firefighters. Well done teams.

BANGLADESH – PART 3

As we settled into the boat that was to be our home for the next three days, we relished the thought that we did not have to travel for hours in a bus or van and had room to walk around and laze on the top deck whilst the world sailed by. With a shudder and a shake we set sail up the river, passing countless fishermen sitting and watching their cone shaped nets for hours on end. The river banks are busy places with women washing clothes and people washing themselves, plus children playing in the water, but as we travelled further up they became less and less populated. Shortly after setting sail we had to stop and get permission from The Forest Commission Department and pay fees to enter the Sundarban. We were then joined by the inevitable armed police – supposedly to protect us from rebels – a cushy number for them.

The next morning we were up early at 5.30 am with a cup of tea and some crackers, then into a small boat and off up the small side river. So peaceful and serene, this was only disturbed by the birds and maybe the odd deer rustling in the undergrowth, not an abundance of wild life. We then ventured inland, by foot, through a mangrove swamp with hundreds of mangrove shoots sticking up through the mud like sharpened bamboo shoots. Further on we came onto a meadow with lush grass and deer peacefully feeding and many different varieties of birds providing orchestral accompaniment. Lo and behold we saw fresh tiger marks (or so we were told) but no tigers. After about an hour's walk we came upon the Bay of Bengal, which was an amazing stretch of white sand and of course the sea. Shirley insisted on her compulsory photo paddling in the water, she is collecting a photo of every sea of the world with her paddling it, (I just take the photo). There were obvious tiger prints in the sand, both adult and cubs, as apparently it is a favourite walking place first thing in the morning. Now they tell us!

When we left the bay and headed back to the boat we walked through an area that had been hit by the Tsunami. It was a sobering experience to see large trees that had been uprooted and dumped many metres on and yet in the middle would be a tree totally unscathed. What had been substantial houses made of concrete and brick were reduced to rubble or left as a skeleton with all the inside ripped out; just total devastation and destruction for all concerned. We finally got back to the boat absolutely starving for a late breakfast/early lunch and then went back to the favourite occupation of resting on the top deck. On most days the middle of the day is a time to rest and avoid the heat, but actually it wasn't too bad, usually being around 28-35 degrees.

Around mid-afternoon we were off again for the serious tiger spotting, we hope (gulp), observing spotted deer and barking deer (they sound just like a dog) on the way, as well as hundreds of caterpillars eating mangrove leaves. The foliage became quite tall and thick with a single file track through and it was at about this point that our tour guide informed us that tigers attack from behind, which of course meant everybody wanted to be first. The local guides started to become wary and show concern, which was followed by whistle blowing and stick banging as signs of a tiger close by had been observed. Apparently they could smell the tiger's urine, but although we wanted to see a tiger, face to face was not the desired option, so we hurried on out of there. Mind you I am still not sure if it was for real or just done to appease us tourists, but either way I stick to the story we came within a few feet of a wild tiger.

Back to the boat for some snacks and tea and coffee – being a strictly Muslim country there is no alcohol available – followed by a late dinner at around 8.30 pm. After finally going to bed at 10.30 for our last night on board, we were woken a little later by thunder and lightning so sleep was fitful until around 2.30 am when an almighty thump and lots of shouting and yelling put an end to sleep. All sorts of things ran through our minds, the most popular possibility being that pirates that had captured us, but no, we had run aground, pushed ashore by the wind.

West Auckland Historical Society Inc.

The West Auckland Historical Society celebrated its 30th birthday last year, and is continuing to plan for many more years to come. It was heartening for the group who worked on the plan to realise that the original purposes of the Society are still as they were in 1977. All that has changed is opportunity to take advantage of the new delivery models now available.

The Society has a total commitment to historical research and study of the West Auckland region along with a strong role to play in the preservation and conservation of historical buildings and artifacts as appropriate, whether as an advocate or as a leader in suitable activities. We also see the facilitation and dissemination of learning and writing about historical subjects and issues in the region and also participating in and developing strong community alliances as important parts of its work. The Society's relationship with the Waitakere Library Service; as a partner in the Jack Diamond Essay Competition; has a key role in this work. The Society provides a judge for the competition as well as organisational and marketing support.

Mill Cottage in Sel Peacock Drive is the research centre and administrative 'home' of the Society's activities, which are administered and organised by volunteers. The core focus of the organisation internally is to increase membership, and externally is to present itself and the facilities available to as wide a section of the community as possible. To this end we offer guided historical walks to the public and interested groups. There are also general meetings at 7.30 pm every 3rd Tuesday of the month which include very interesting invited speakers on a broad range of fascinating subjects. These general meetings are held at the Corban Estate Arts Centre in the Opanuku Room and are open to the public for a very modest \$2 fee and include a light supper. Subjects as diverse as Passchendale, local and national photographers'

collections, tales of a Titirangi past and the history of the water supply to Avondale and Mt Albert have all kept the audiences enthralled.

Past fundraising, promotional and public events have included a Victorian Garden Party in early 2007 which was a grand success and the formal opening of the Model Room which is a new extension to Mill Cottage and houses Charles Fuller's model of the early days of the Henderson's Mill settlement, as well as a working model of a kauri trip dam. We have cooperated extensively with Project Twin Streams which has seen vast improvement to the landscaped surroundings of the cottage including the reinstatement of the water wheel at the stream's edge and safe walking paths in the vicinity of the cottage and the bridge.

The Society is close to completing a fully computerised database of the books, photographs and other materials in its custody and is about to launch an internet presence and the production of a quarterly journal to a high quality professional standard.

The President of the West Auckland Historical Society is Trevor Pollard QSM, and the editor of the monthly newsletter is Grant Cole.

They are both available by email at westaucklandhistorical@xtra.co.nz as is the Secretary for general enquiries.

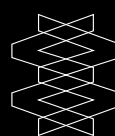
